Dr. Kenny Broad is an environmental anthropologist who studies the relationship between humans and their environment. He received his PhD in anthropology from Columbia University in 1999. Kenny has led or participated in extreme scientific and filmmaking expeditions on every continent - from urban jungles to the deepest caves on the planet - to gather information and samples that shed light on little known environmental and cultural subjects. He is a professor at the University of Miami's (UM) Rosenstiel School of Marine and Atmospheric Science and is Director of UM's Abess Center for Ecosystem Science. He also Co-Directs the Center for Research on Environmental Decisions at Columbia University. Broad has worked on interdisciplinary aspects of marine resource management, ranging from the impacts of climate variability and change to perceptions of environmental risk by local stakeholders. Broad's awards include selection as the 2011 National Geographic Explorer of the Year, the National Geographic 2006 Emerging Explorer Award, and he is a Fellow National of the Explorers Club (2009). His recent expedition to the underwater caves of the Bahamas was featured as the cover story of the August 2010 issue of National Geographic Magazine and as PBS/NOVA one hour special.
