1996 - 2006 Director of Government Relations - Save the Manatee Club - Tallahassee, Florida Responsible for governmental coordination regarding federal and state legislative, executive, and regulatory actions; including advocacy, overall recovery planning and aquatic ecosystem management/habitat activities. Other responsibilities include giving expert testimony, strategic case preparation, program analysis, and specialized technical support for other program components.

1995 - 1996 Environmental Program Administrator, Bureau of Protected Species Management, Division of Marine Resources, Department of Environmental Protection - Tallahassee, Florida

Responsible for all aspects of marine mammal management activities with emphasis on endangered manatees and right whales. Specific emphasis was given to the integration of ecosystem based management practices. Areas of involvement included overseeing biological assessments for permits and leases, rules development and legal defense, current and long-range planning, and GIS applications. Responsible for all aspects of research programs including aerial surveys, telemetry, salvage and necropsy, and related programs. During my tenure the program expanded dramatically. Significant actions included the preparation for adoption of the 1989 Governor and Cabinet policy regarding manatee protection and boating facility siting which lead to the major improvements being accomplished in overall protection measures and support for manatee and manatee habitat.

Coordinated manatee recovery activities with Federal, state, and local agencies and other groups. Served as staff and/or department representative for the Manatee Technical Advisory Council and Save the Manatee Committee. Developed and facilitated the implementation of manatee protection rules and oversaw Department efforts to place and maintain regulatory and warning signs. Conducted biological assessments of various development applications to assess their potential impacts upon the manatee and its associated ecosystem. Exercised responsibility for planning, implementation, and monitoring of manatee related research projects, including population abundance, distribution, habitat characteristics, and causes of mortality through the establishment of a state salvage and necropsy program. Overall planning was strongly correlated to intermesh with the newly adopted Growth Management Act.

1983-1984 Senior Management Manatee Recovery Coordinator, Division of Marine Resources, DNR - Orlando, Florida.

Responsible for all aspects, including the initial establishment, of manatee research, protection, permit review, budget development and future planning efforts on behalf of the endangered manatee. Official duties also included Legislative lobbying for support of programs and program budgets, administrative rule development, and extensive coordination with Federal, state, and local governments. This position was established under a contract with the USFWS to facilitate the development of an extensive state manatee recovery program.

1980 -1983 Manatee Recovery Activities Coordinator, under contract to U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service through FAS - Orlando, Florida

Coordinated all aspects of Manatee Recovery Program. Functioned as primary author of the "Manatee Comprehensive Work Plan" which was the forerunner of the annotated species recovery plans which were later developed for the manatee and other species. Duties included extensive coordination and evaluation of the various recovery tasks to enhance effectiveness. Duties involved extensive coordination with various levels of local, state, and Federal Agencies and organizations. This position was established under contract with the USFWS as part of a joint effort lead by the Marine Mammal Commission to enhance manatee recovery objectives and actions.

1977-1980 Research Scientist with Florida Audubon Society (FAS) - Orlando, Florida

Primary responsibilities were focused around conducting manatee aerial survey research to determine relative abundance and distribution of manatees and to determine the effects of power plant operations upon manatees. Responsibilities included developing and carrying-out additional manatee research and public awareness programs. Activities included bill drafting and direct scientific testimony and lobbying to influence the adoption of the Manatee Sanctuary Act. Other responsibilities included evaluating various development projects and aquatic weed control measures for their potential effects on aquatic systems.
